#### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Review the Portsmouth City Public Schools Code of Conduct thoroughly.
- 2. Conform to all principles, practices, rules and procedures outlined in the Student Code of Conduct and Student Handbook located on Churchland's website.
- 3. Report promptly and regularly to all assigned classes and study locations.
- 4. Out of school suspensions may result in the loss of privileges throughout the year including, but not limited to, pep rallies, homecomings, prom, senior week, etc.
- 5. Any student suspended who finishes his/her high school requirements in an alternative setting may not be able to participate in Churchland High School's graduation ceremony.
- 6. Student drop off and pick up is in the student parking lot. Not the flag pole circle and Not at the Teacher Entrance.
- 7. Provide written excuse to 1st block teacher for any absence (within 2 school days).
- 8. Students are not permitted to carry to class personal balloons, flowers, large bouquets or other items that may cause distractions.
- 9. Perform academically to the BEST of my ability.
- 10. Be courteous, cooperative, receptive and respectful to all teachers, administrators, and peers.
- 11. Maintain acceptable classroom behavior.
- 12. Refrain from damaging, defacing or littering school property.
- 13. Bring only school-related and/or required materials inside the school building. (No radios, CD players, IPODs etc.)
- 14. Maintain an appropriate personal appearance (dress code, personal hygiene, etc.).
- 15. Promote school pride and school spirit by supporting school activities and school-related programs.
- 16. Be under the supervision of a teacher, coach or activity sponsor when in the building after school hours.
- 17. Keep parents or guardians informed of school activities and reports.
- 18. Review the Guidelines for Homework and follow policies for appropriate behavior.
- 19. Keep an accurate account of my own grades and credits accumulated.
- 20. Check with my counselor periodically, to determine my scholastic progress or when other information is needed.

#### CAFETERIA

Students are to remain seated unless in a serving line. No outside food is

allowed in the Cafeteria. No visitors are allowed in the Cafeteria.

#### CELL PHONES and Electronics

CELL PHONES are not to be visible and remain OFF during school hours. Students found in violation will have them confiscated and returned to a parent. All cell phones, electronic devices and other confiscated items cannot be picked up for 48 hours. When the parent/guardian picks up the phone they will be required to sign General Confiscation Form acknowledging that if the same or similar item is confiscated a second time, it will be kept until the end of the semester. The third offense will result in the item being held until the last calendar day of the school year. Confiscated items can only be picked up on school days between the hours of 2:20pm to 3:00pm.

#### TARDIES

- 1. Any student will be considered tardy if not inside his or her class room by the time the late bell rings.
- 2. When tardy to school or class, students will be subject to the following disciplinary actions:
- 3. Students who are tardy to school and do not check in at the designated tardy area will be subject to the following disciplinary actions:
  - Parent Conference
  - In-School Suspension
  - Out-of-School Suspension

Students who drive and are tardy to school may lose their parking privilege.

# LEAVING SCHOOL/CLASS WITHOUT PERMISSION

Students are not permitted to leave the building during the school day without permission from an administrator. Students may not step out to their cars for any reason. Once a student has arrived on school grounds on a school day, he/she may not leave. Students MAY NOT contact a parent/guardian to pick them up from school without administrative approval. Students waiting to be picked up must remain in their classroom until their parent/guardian arrives to sign them out of school. Parents/Guardians must check their son/daughter out of school through the Main Office. Students who violate any part of this policy are subject to disciplinary action. (Students caught leaving and/or returning to the school

building without permission are subject to a 3 day out-of-school suspension). This includes going to the parking lot without permission.

#### CLASS CUTTING

Students reporting to school and failing to report to first block, assigned classes, and/or assigned student activities will be considered cutting and will be subject to disciplinary actions.



#### SPECIFIC STUDENT DRESS CODE REGULATIONS

Portsmouth City Public School students shall not wear the following items:

- Clothing, pins, jewelry, accessories or other items of adornment displaying obscene, profane, derogatory, violent or gang-related messages, themes, designs, or pictures
- Clothing, pins, jewelry, accessories or other items of adornment conveying messages related to or promoting the use of alcohol, drugs, or tobacco products, or messages that promote illegal activities
- Clothing, pins, jewelry, accessories or other items of adornment depicting bawdy, salacious or sexually suggestive messages
- Clothing that is transparent or exposes the midriff, navel or cleavage
- Pants, skirts and/or shorts that sag below the waistline or must be held in place with the hands
- Underwear as outer garments or clothing that exposes underwear (including, but not limited to, stretch, spandex or nylon tights, leotards, biker pants, biker shorts, bathing suits, pajamas)
- Tank tops, halter tops, garments with spaghetti straps, tube tops, fishnet tops, strapless dresses, or other clothing that is not appropriate because of slits, rips or holes in the garment
- Accessories which could in some way pose a danger to the wearer or others; and/or could be used as weapons (including, but not limited to, two-or-three finger rings, chains hanging from clothes, picks, hair chop sticks)
- Clothing that is too tight and/or is inappropriate in length as measured by any of the following measuring methods, as determined by principal/designee.
  - a. Shorts shorter than six (6) inches above the student's mid-knee
  - b. Length must pass Flamingo test (stand with both feet flat on the floor. Lift one foot and bend the leg backward at a 90-degree angle; the other leg must remain straight. If the back of the skirt touches the calf of the bent leg, the skirt is long enough. If the skirt does not touch the calf, the skirt is too short)
  - c. Fingertip test (With arms at side, the finger tips must touch fabric)
- Inappropriate footwear (including, but not limited to, shower shoes and beach shoes, such as flip flops, bedroom slippers, and unfastened shoes or shoes missing appropriate closures)
- Head coverings or accessories that are not related to or required by student's bona fide religious practices (including but not limited to, stocking caps, do rag, wave caps, scarves or bandanas) Head coverings must be placed in students' lockers upon arriving at school.
- Only clothing designed for street wear may be worn. Robes, pajamas, nightgowns, etc., are not permitted
- Items that are intended for outdoor use (including, but not limited to, hats, caps, and similar head coverings, scarves, jackets and coats)

#### ACCESS

Wilson offers Early Childhood, Nursing, Pharmacy Tech and Culinary Arts. Norcom offers Hotel and Restaurant Management, Biotechnology, Experimental Design, DE Medical Terminology, Sports Medicine, Cosmetology and Geospatial Technology. Transportation is provided by the school system from the home school to the selected school and back when classes are over.
